# Hook

Project this image on the board (or share your screen), found in 1.1.0 and discuss the following question as a class:



## Introduction Activity

With the overview page up projected on the board (in person) or through screen share (remote), give a brief introduction of Kognity and the useful features for students, by explaining that:

- The content in each section of the book incorporates features like videos, external links, definitions and activities to enhance students' learning.
- The **practice centre** has strength tests and battles for all topics that allow students to check their knowledge and understanding of each topic. As they engage with the **strength test and battles**, their **strength bar** (on the overview page) will increase, allowing them to keep track of their strong content areas and areas they need to work on.
- Teachers can assign readings and questions and can keep track of student progress.

#### **Group Activity**

- 1. Divide students into groups of three.
- 2. Ask them to complete the following Kognity TOK Scavenger Hunt for subtopics 1.1 1.4 which allows students to identify key elements of TOK and familiarise themselves with key elements of their Kognity books.
- 3. When students are finished, have them share their answers as a class.

#### **Independent Activity**

- 1. Have students read section 2.1.1, taking notes in their Kognity notebook.
- 2. Have students complete section questions at the end of the reading.

*Note*: Explain that the independent activity was a taste of the reading assignments students will get throughout the year.

## **Revision Activities**

At the end of section 2.1.1, there are several possible activities you can do with your class.

- Have students complete the activity in the "activity box" at the end of <u>2.1.1</u> either as a reflective journal response, group think, talk and share, or a Flipgrid recording!
- Have students go to the <u>practice centre</u> to take the 2.1 <u>Strength test</u> as a post assessment, or engage in a <u>strength battle</u> with a classmate (These questions encompass all of topic 2).
- Create a <u>question</u> or <u>reading assignment</u> for <u>2.1.1</u>. Then, have students head over to the <u>Assignments tab</u> to identify how assignments are presented to them. Now they can complete their first graded homework/ activity in Kognity!
