For students:

Students can test their listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills in ESL through completing vocabulary activities, skills boxes, and comprehension exercises and receiving immediate feedback on their responses.



For teachers:

Teachers get immediate feedback on their students' progress through the Questions and Textbook data, located on the Insights tab. Here, teachers can view a visual representation of student quiz and assignment scores. Teachers can then easily identify those students who need help, which makes intervention fast and efficient.

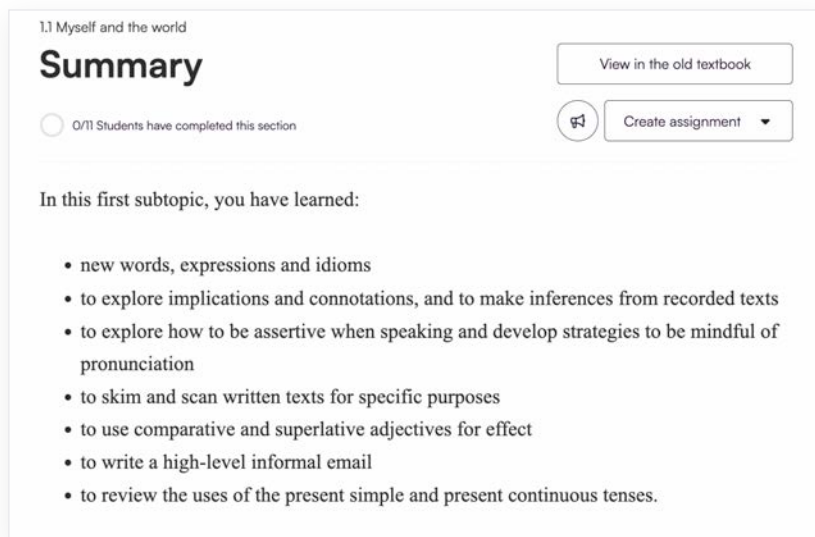

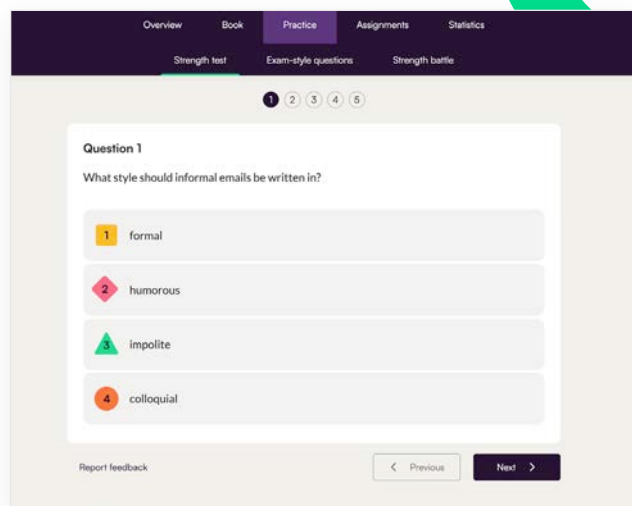

How does Kognity help with IGCSE Assessment Preparation?

Each subtopic focuses on all four skills of the language (L, S, R, W) in a variety of instructional 'Study Skills' boxes in addition to exercises that progress in difficulty with the subtopics. Furthermore, each skill is being enhanced through specific steps that enable students to do a perfect job in every exercise.

 **Study skills**

Shall + infinitive is a variation of will + infinitive that is more formal and can be used to make offers, refusals or proposals.

- Offers or refusals:
 - ***Shall I help** you with your workload?*
 - ***I shall not put up** with you being late to work.*
- Proposals:
 - ***Shall we meet** the new intern and show her around the office?*

As for the grammar, it is first explained and examples are given, while later the scaffolding is removed so students can proceed with independent application. Moreover, the vocabulary boxes are closely related to all four skills, making sure students express themselves in the best possible way.

 **Grammar tip**

These tips will help you to achieve a formal register in your writing.

- Using the **first conditional** can help you sound confident while being polite, by referring to future situations as possible. For example:
 - ***If you select me**, and I do hope you may give me a chance, **I will be** diligent in ...*
- Using **several verb tenses** will allow you to communicate complex ideas and showcase your proficient use of English. You could use past simple + present perfect tense in combination. For example:
 - ***I felt** it was important for me to build a portfolio showcasing my artistic style and communicative approach, as well as my motivated personality and organisational skills. **I have recently completed** a data analytics course online.*
- Using **inversions** and **discourse markers** can help you sound more formal and in greater command of the language. For example:
 - ***Not only have I** a channel of my own, **but I am also** the manager of other accounts.*
 - ***Moreover**, I have recently completed a data analytics course online.*
- Using **modal verbs** in formal writing will help you describe things that you believe to be generally true or possible without sounding rude. For example:
 - *Hopefully, you **may** find my knowledge in the world of data science to be of interest.*

How does Kognity help with IGCSE Assessment Preparation?

Finally, what everyone loves about this resource is the exam style questions (ESQ) section in the assignments tab. These ESQ's show students what the real exam will look like and what is expected of them. The scaffolding has again been removed and students are expected to complete the tasks in exam conditions, i.e. no steps, no instructions, and no help from their teacher or peers.
